O Blue tit

Its colourful mix of blue, yellow, white and green make the blue tit one of the most attractive resident garden birds.



🔵 Great tit

The largest UK tit. Look closely – birds with the broadest, boldest black chest stripe are highest up the pecking order.

○ Long-tailed tit

With tails longer than their body, these small birds move through trees and hedgerows in flocks. Listen for high pitched squeaks.

O Cetti's Warbler

It's easier to hear this chunky, dark brown warbler than it is to see it. Its song is a loud and sudden whistling blast!

O Sedge Warbler

This warbler has a well-marked eyestripe. Its song uses some long and loud un-varied notes, interjected with a rapid outpouring of whistles and trills.

O Reed Warbler

The reed warbler is plainer and brownish in colour. Its song is more chatty, slowpaced, repeating similar notes with the odd whistle thrown in.

O Chaffinch

In flight, it shows a flash of white on its wings and white outer tail feathers. Often seen in gardens and hedgerows.

Goldfinch

A highly coloured finch with a delightful liquid twittering song and call, in the past they were prized as caged songbirds.







Sings nearly all year round

O Robin

The UK's favourite bird, males and females look identical while young birds are spotted with golden brown and no red.

🔿 Dunnock

A shy bird usually seen on its own, look out for them shuffling along the edges of flowerbeds or under bushes.

O Wren

A tiny bird, it looks almost round, with very short wings and a short, stiff straight tail. Flits about among the undergrowth.

O Nuthatch

About the size of a great tit, nuthatches are solid looking birds often seen running headfirst down tree trunks.

O Treecreeper

A small, very active, bird that lives in trees. Can look surprisingly like a mouse as it runs spiralling up tree trunks.

O Blackbird

A member of the thrush family, blackbirds have a beautiful mellow song and can often be seen feeding on berry bushes.

○ Great spotted woodpecker

Black and white with a distinctive "bouncing" flight. It pecks holes in wood then extracts insects using its extremely long tongue.

🔿 Green woodpecker

This woodpecker spends more time on the ground hunting ants than up a tree. It has a vibrant red cap and bright green feathers.



O Sparrowhawk

A stunning, agile hunter of small birds, it succeeds in only 10% of its hunts. It is an important piece of the food chain.
